Sheldon Bellovin 1940-2021

Sheldon (Shelly) Bellovin was born in Brooklyn in 1940, went to Erasmus Hall HS, Brooklyn College and NYCC for metal design and drafting. He married his wife, Sheila, in 1960 and had 3 sons, Evan, Glenn and Michael.


He began working at Legion Lighting in 1961 and worked for his father Jonas and Uncles Nathan and Jack who had established Legion in 1946 after making lanterns for the Navy during WWII. In the 1980s, he became President of Legion Lighting. Evan and Michael came into the business shortly thereafter. Shelly became CEO in 2005.

Shelly was an avid boater and golfer. He served on the Board of Directors of the Mayor's Committee of NYC Manufacturers and was a past President and Board member for the Local Development Corporation of East New York. He also served on the Board of the East Brooklyn Business Improvement District and was Vice Chair of the Employees Security Fund of Local 3 IBEW. In 1998, he was awarded Crain's "Business Person of the Year." Legion Lighting has been a sustaining member of IES since 1959 and Shelly has been a member since he started in the lighting industry. He also created the Jonas Bellovin Scholarship for Lighting Education, in honor of his father.

Shelly Bellovin passed away on Monday July 19, 2021 after a three year battle with esophagus cancer. Shelly is survived by his wife of 61 years, Sheila, his three sons, Evan, Glenn and Michael, two daughters in law, Liz and Diane, and 5 grandchildren, Jonathan, Jill, Nicole, Sophie and Jonas.

Theodore "Ted" Henning 1926-2023

Theodore W. Henning of Plandome, NY, died on April 6 at age 97. Born in Brooklyn, Ted worked in the family business there, Belmont Metals, for 70 years, and served on the boards of the Local Development Corporation of East New York and the East Brooklyn BID for several decades.

Ted was a U.S. Navy veteran of both World War II and the Korean War and was a graduate of MIT and Columbia Business School. Ted was active in the Manhasset, NY community for 60 years, including serving six years on the Manhasset School Board.

Ted had an endless curiosity and enjoyed sailing, skiing, stargazing, and traveling. Perhaps most notable was Ted's love of connecting with people.

Ted is survived by his wife Marjorie; children Robin Rocchi (Albino), Theodore (Denise), and Christine Ferranti (Michael); and five beloved grandchildren. Preface

This is the second edition of the East Brooklyn BID's original business directory from 2004. In this update, we aim to not only revise the listing of current firms, but also provide insights from a detailed business survey which will inform the direction of the BID over the next several years. In marketing the assets in the BID among the core industries of transportation, distribution, manufacturing and building trades, we celebrate foundational firms such as Belmont Metals, Legion Lighting, Adriatic Wood, Consolidated Bus and Eastern Steel. We also highlight newer enterprises, like Universe City, that have added to the creative output of the industrial park. We anticipate this will be of value to potential customers, job seekers, entrepreneurs considering a relocation to the BID and constituent companies interested in procurement from their neighbors. We also want this to be informative to service providers, including City agencies, eager to support local economic development and sustain the district as a mainstay of domestic manufacturing operations.





Mission And Services

The mission of the EBBID is to offer supportive services to augment those provided by the City of New York, thereby enhancing neighborhood appearance and business operations. The EBBID's general services include sanitation, pest control, graffiti removal, ombudsman assistance, economic development, BID promotion, infrastructure improvement and area beautification. The EBBID's Clean Team, for instance, provides sanitation support for the district.

Its ombudsman help has often involved engaging city agencies on behalf of EBBID businesses. In the last several years, these initiatives have included identifying vacant land with the Department of Citywide Administrative Services (DCAS) to utilize productively on behalf of EBBID businesses, working with the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) to implement and maintain rain gardens, modifying parking regulations with the Department of Transportation (DOT) and performing security surveys with the police department. EBBID economic development services also include assistance with business credits and tax incentives, navigating government regulations and workforce development and hiring.




INTRODUCTION AND HISTORY

The East Brooklyn Business Improvement District, or EBBID, part of the first "In-Place Industrial Park" in New York City, encompasses 40 square blocks in the heart of Brooklyn. It is bordered by Powell Street to the West, Atlantic Avenue to the North, Pennsylvania Avenue to the East and Sutter Avenue to the South.

The construction of the initial section of the Long Island Rail Road along Atlantic Avenue in 1836 spurred the growth of factories adjacent to the tracks. A 19th century Connecticut merchant, John Pitkin, purchased 135 acres and envisioned the area as "East New York," a business hub rivaling Manhattan, eventually starting a shoe factory on the avenue that now bears his name. The Panic of 1837 impacted his plans, though immigrants from Europe (initially Germans, and then followed by Italians, Russians and Eastern Europeans) later stimulated development in the area. Many constituent businesses emerged organically. For instance, Belmont Metals began in 1896 as a backyard smelting operation by the Henning family and is now a foundry occupying almost an entire city block.

Manufacturing in the area declined in the 20th century, with demographic shifts to the suburbs, aggressive foreclosure policies and industry moving to lower cost locations

first in the South and later abroad. In midcentury, the area experienced urban decay marked by elements such as elevated crime, high unemployment, abandoned buildings and a retreat of city services. Despite these challenges, many multi-generational industrial businesses persisted and made up the founding members of the EBBID. The not-forprofit EBBID was incorporated in 1983 by property owners, businesses and community members, in concert with the City of New York, to revitalize the area as a viable place to reside and conduct business.





It is of vital interest to New York City to support the businesses that persevere in industrial operations and preserve their well-paying manufacturing jobs, many of them unionized. The spectrum of occupations EBBID firms are engaged in today span lighting and electrical, metal production and recycling, lumber, filmmaking, plumbing, candleworks, food, transportation, automotive, construction, the arts, furnituremaking, landscaping, retail, restaurant equipment and more.

Business Community

The EBBID is a vibrant business community that offers the most affordable industrial real estate in Brooklyn, a talented labor pool, a nearby Workforce1 Career Center, local sourcing from cooperative business neighbors, access to public transit (with five subways, LIRR and three bus lines), the availability of truck routes and proximity to JFK and LaGuardia Airports. Residential areas, retail stores, eateries, religious institutions and the Trey Whitfield School add to the diversity of the district.

Neighborhood Demographics

The EBBID primarily spans the Census Neighborhood Tabulation Areas (NTA) for East New York (North) [pop. 42,818] with some overlap into Brownsville [pop. 60, 470]. Within the focus of the three Census Tracts this incorporates (Tracts 908, 1144, 1198), there is a population of 12,003, with 3,631 households. The average household size is 2.88 individuals. 31% of the population is under the age of 18. The largest percentage of residents are Black/African American at 49%, while Hispanic/Latinos make up 42%. Non-Hispanic Whites are 3% of the area population, while Asians make up 1.5% of residents in these Census tracts. With regards to housing, there are a total of 3,631 housing units encompassing this district, with 3,415 of those occupied and 216 listed as vacant.

As of May 2023, the unemployment rate in Brooklyn (5.4%) is higher than Manhattan (4.5%) and New York City overall (5.1%). Only the Bronx (6.7%) has a higher unemployment rate in the five boroughs. According to latest 2021 neighborhood-level figures, in East New York as a whole, the unemployment rate is 12.8%, more than double the Brooklyn-wide level. In Brownsville, almost 1 in 5 working age residents are unemployed, with a 2021 unemployment rate of 18%. The median household income in East New York is \$55,880, approximately 23% less than the overall New York City median household income of \$72,150. Meanwhile, the poverty rate in East New York is 19.2%, compared to 18% overall across the city. In Brownsville, the median household income is also lower, at \$40,620, and the poverty rate is almost 29%.

Academic Outreach

In recent years, the EBBID has supported research initiatives from architecture and urban design studios at Columbia, Cornell and the University of Virginia. The development of Broadway Junction was a focus of students at Columbia and UVA, while Cornell studied the organic growth of culture and businesses in East New York. Cornell students collaborated with Universe City in developing these design ideas. EBBID Executive Director Bill Wilkins served as both a neighborhood resource as well as a guest critic for midterm and final reviews.

Scholarships

The EBBID awards scholarships every year to area schools (Thomas Jefferson, Maxwell HS) or local residents who demonstrate academic excellence and/or are in need of financial assistance to attend institutions of higher learning. This year, the EBBID donated \$500 to both Jamar Anderson and Odessa Forbes. Mr. Anderson will be attending Medgar Evers College, and Ms. Forbes will be matriculating at Hampton University in the fall.



On Thursday, June 29, 2023, the EBBID was pleased to present a \$500 Scholarship to David Jules. Mr. Jules is the first male valedictorian for College Prep. College Prep is located on the campus of Erasmus Hall HS. Mr. Jules will be attending St Johns University in the fall.

Program Highlights

The EBBID hosted its first annual Industrial Park
Community Summit on June 1, 2023, as a
constituent gathering to review the business
landscape of the park, consider any challenges,
propose solutions and promote manufacturing.
Taking place at the SoFive indoor recreational
facility on Pitkin Avenue in the district, we discussed
upcoming initiatives, heard from City agency
representatives and received feedback from
business owners. Responses from attendees focused
on issues relating to sanitation and illegal dumping,
homeless encampments, traffic safety, more stop
signs (particularly around Trey Whitfield School) and
energy compliance requirements to reduce
greenhouse gas emissions.

Other outreach events have included Small Business Day and Meet the Developer, to connect real estate developers with local businesses for procurement opportunities. In addition, the first Friday in October is National Manufacturing Day, and the EBBID promotes area businesses by organizing a district tour with students from Trey Whitfield School along with press coverage.



The EBBID also coordinates a variety of other programs to promote outreach and visibility between the organization and the New York City community. For example, the EBBID directed the New York City Economic Development Corporation's (NYCEDC) 2017 marketing campaign to promote district businesses through street banners and other outreach materials. EBBID leadership has served on advisory committees for urban planning initiatives such as the East New York rezoning and the development of Broadway Junction.

In addition, the EBBID has sponsored a variety of arts events to promote cultural activities in the district. This includes initiating the Public Theater's productions of neighborhood Shakespeare performances and supporting local organizations such as Universe City and ARTs East New York. Additionally, with support from the EBBID, Legion Lighting has hosted urban art fairs in their factory. The EBBID also supported the Gates of Atlantic project, a public mural program to decorate retail security gates along Atlantic Avenue.

The EBBID has also helped implement the transformation of vacant lots into vibrant public spaces, from the Williams Avenue Community Garden to ongoing efforts to create a park at the entrance to the Jackie Robinson Parkway. Part of the work on Williams Avenue included a collaboration between Trey Whitfield School students and




East Brooklyn BID Survey – Key Findings

The East Brooklyn BID engaged in a variety of outreach strategies to connect with constituent businesses to update the business directory and gather information via a business survey. The survey was an effort to get an in-depth understanding of business economics and conditions within the EBBID. It consists of 37 questions posed to business operators, ranging from contact information to revenue, business development sources, labor conditions and EBBID physical environment conditions. Survey data was gathered from business owners by using eBlasts, phone banking, hosting an in-person business summit, drive-by canvassing and door knocking. Observations were taken as to existing companies, firm closures and new business operations.

Business Sectors

The EBBID is a diverse industrial park, with manufacturing leading the way. Based on the EBBID survey, we found a diverse range of business sectors in the community. Among the major areas of operations, approximately:



These findings emphasizes the multi-generational character of the industrial park.



Minority and Women-Owned Business Enterprises (MWBE)

The district hopes to attract and register more MWBE businesses.



Around 74% of business respondents are not a designated MWBE (minority/woman-owned business enterprise). Only 22% of businesses surveyed are a designated MWBE. Additionally, around 95% of business respondents are not a service/disabled veteran-owned business.

Procurement

The EBBID will continue to advocate for government procurement opportunities, while constituent businesses buy from each other.

According to survey data, over 70% of businesses have not secured procurement opportunities from city, state and federal agencies. Meanwhile,

less than 20% of businesses have secured economic development incentives from city, state and federal agencies.


According to EBBID survey data, around 65% of businesses source materials and services from neighboring EBBID businesses.






Projected Earnings and the Impact of the COVID-19 Pandemic


The Covid-19 pandemic continues to have an impact on the district's operations.














Whereas more than half of EBBID businesses do not anticipate a revenue increase between the years 2022 and 2023.



Land Ownership

Site ownership helps to retain and stabilize EBBID businesses.

Based on the EBBID survey, around 57% of businesses own their site location. Meanwhile, around 22% of businesses rent, and under 5% of businesses sublease. Over 60% of businesses do not own additional property within the EBBID.

Workforce

A highly skilled workforce drives business operations, but the availability of appropriate training impacts local hiring.

According to EBBID survey data,

85% of business respondents highlight skills/qualifications as the major reason for not hiring and retaining a locally sourced workforce. A diverse range of hiring strategies are reported from EBBID businesses, with around 41% primarily hiring walk-in candidates, approximately 32% of respondents acquire talent through their website and around 32% choose to mainly hire from internal job postings distributed by staff. Over 25% of business respondents have a unionized workforce.






EBBID Outreach

The EBBID continues to be a vital resource for constituent businesses.

According to survey data, more than half of business respondents are familiar with services and advocacy available through the EBBID, whereas around a third of them would like to learn more.





And 25% wanted to learn more about the NYS Small Business Credit Initiative.

Nearly 80% of businesses would like to be closely connected to the resources the EBBID has to offer, and half of the respondents expressed an interest in serving on the EBBID Board of Directors.





Business Environment

The EBBID has coordinated City agencies and augmented their services to support business operations.



Around 74% of businesses have filed complaints to city agencies concerning business environment issues.



Approximately 53% received an ineffective response from city agencies concerning business environment issues.

In response to constituent company needs, the EBBID has helped organize targeted responses by City agencies to improve business operations. Some recent initiatives have been working with the NYC DOT Borough Commissioner's office to adjust parking regulations for industrial businesses and coordinating a security survey with the Inspector of the 75th Precinct. Furthermore, the EBBID's "Clean Team" has provided additional attention to the sanitation needs of the district.

Inflation and Future Investments

Inflation has impacted business operations, but firms see a positive outlook and hope to invest in expansion.

According to EBBID survey data, around 96% of respondents notice recent inflation has impacted business, and the same percentage of businesses are not considering refinancing.

65% of businesses expressed interest in expansion, while just under 60% were considering building up vertically.

Approximately 60% of business respondents expressed interest in making a capital investment and/or purchasing new equipment.

Around 56% have energy rebates and/or are considering renewable energy.

Around 64% of business respondents do not have a succession plan in place.


